The 6th Annual AHEPA Journey to Greece Concludes!



The AHEPA Journey to Greece concluded its 6th Annual Program! The 2011 JTG Program started back on June 27th with two complete programs for our college age students. Session #1 was devoted to a program on community volunteerism, with our students participating as official volunteers for the Athens Special Olympics! These students also completed their requirements for a three unit course on community service in conjunction to the Olympics. Session #2, featured an excursion visiting all four of the ancient Pan-Hellenic game archaeological sites! In addition, the students completed the requirements for two courses, or six semester units of credit! Both Sessions were able to join together for a cruise thanks to a grant provided by the National Hellenic Society!

This year 42 students participated in the two Sessions of the Journey. Our students represented 11 states and Canada! Over the past 6 years the Journey has served 382 alumni from 28 states and Canada, representing 77 different universities! Once again, the Journey to Greece is under the direction of AHEPA Past Supreme President, Dr. Jim Dimitriou, who re launched the Journey as a unique University travel-study program over 6 years go! Over the six years, the Journey has 382 alumni! **According to Dr. Dimitriou, "the mission of the Journey is to**

provide a program that immerses our students in Greek culture and society, while students earn transferable credit from an accredited American university while studying in Athens!"

Over the course of the Journey to Greece, the **AHEPA Athens Chapter, HJ-1**, provided by Welcome and Farewell receptions to the Journey groups! The AHEPA family of Mother Hellas has continued to assist the students and the Journey to Greece throughout our 6 year program. It is always nice to know that the AHEPA family is so close at hand to serve our students and the program!

A highlight of our program was the very special visit to the ancient site of Nemea! The home of one of the Pan-Hellenic Games of the ancient world, Nemea was brought to life for our students by the UC Berkeley Emeritus **Professor, Stephen Miller**, who is the archaeologist that first uncovered the Nemean athletic stadium. Professor Miller invited the Journey to Greece Program to participate in the **2012 Nemean Games** that will be re-enacted next summer! We look forward to another rewarding experience at Nemea!

Dr. Jim Dimitriou has been the Director of the Journey to Greece Program for the last six years! He has planned and developed the new JTG along with Dr. Peter Wilkins of UINDY. His goal has been to offer a program that will immerse our students into Greek society and culture while affording them an opportunity to earn transferable university credit while in Greece! The inception for the program came when Dr. Dimitriou was Supreme President of the Order of AHEPA. A lifetime educator and experienced leader in study abroad program, Dimitriou has carefully planned and implemented the program since its beginning. Special excursions, visits, briefings and presentations have been included to give students a rewarding experience not available to the average traveler! In addition to directing and planning the program, Dr. Dimitriou teaches courses in international relations and foreign policy. He is the father of Dimitri, a sophomore at UC Berkeley and Kara, a Master's student at the American University in Washington, DC.
